The boy must be won over at the very beginning. Otherwise he is liable to walk or run away from the Home as soon as an opportunity presents itself. We have no high fence around our Home, no bars on our windows, no locks on our doors, and we do not wish to have these. Unless we can influence the boy by moral persuasion, no physical restraint has results.

From Fr. Flanagan's writings

From a speech made by Father Flanagan before the Omaha council of Social Agencies on November 8, 1927 at the Jewish Community Center, Omaha.

From 50 to 75 percent of our children are non-placeable for reasons already given. Some of these children are with me a year, some several years. These are considered our permanent family, and, when I say family, I want you to know that our every effort is directed towards binding them together by the ties of personal interest, love and sacrifice, which are reciprocated by their gratitude and obedience, and this happy condition makes it possible for 150 to 200, once neglected boys, to be happy, smile, dream of, and make plans for a hopeful future. This healthy and happy environment has transformed hundreds of problem children into splendid types of constructive citizens, and this, and this alone is our reward and recompense.

The institutional care of non-placeable children offers our children a splendid public school education up to and including the ninth grade. Our teachers are among the best, holding life grade certificates, and are called upon to use great patience in analyzing the case of each new child to ascertain where it is best for him to start, what his peculiarities are, and find a way to reach him in order to get a response. Here the backward child is given special attention, and helped by his teachers outside of regular school hours until he is able to take up regular work in the class room...

We have examples by the hundreds of talented, healthy, normal boys who had proven to be too difficult to be cared for by widowed mothers, helpless fathers, or indifferent relatives. These boys, because of lack of supervision at home, or no supervision at all, were becoming very much neglected. They wouldn't go to school half the time, and when they did, accomplished little or no results. Not having the proper kind of home, they, naturally, sought companionship on the streets and in the alleys with similarly neglected types of boys. In fact, their home ceased to be what it should be—a place to radiate love, interest, proper care, and an exacting discipline, which children should respond to by gratitude and strict obedience. Here we have to deal with the undisciplined type of child, and again the institution performs a great service. The work of reconstructing this type of neglected child by first helping him to unlearn many of the things he has learned, and endeavor to mould

his character with nobler thoughts and higher ideals, is one that calls for considerable tact of the experienced teacher, and a full measure of patience.

The boy must be won over at the very beginning. Otherwise he is liable to walk or run away from the Home as soon as an opportunity presents itself. We have no high fence around our Home, no bars on our windows, no locks on our doors, and we do not wish to have these.

Unless we can influence the boy by moral persuasion, no physical restraint results. The jail and reform school methods have their own specific type of discipline which those in authority consider necessary, but our Home must perform a different kind of service through moral persuasion to mould the character of our children.
