ABOUT HIS TRIP TO IRELAND

National Catholic News Service, July 23, 1946

"The boys of Ireland are blessed above all other boys, first of all because the nation has the Faith," the Rt. Rev. Msgr. E.J. Flanagan, director of Boys Town, said upon his return from a visit to Ireland, where he had been to study juvenile problems, deliver a series of lectures on Boys Town, and to visit relatives.

"It would seem to me," he said, "that the boys of Ireland, if given proper direction in their schools and church organizations and on the athletic fields, should grow up to be the type of men that will make Ireland a great nation—standard bearers of citizenry for the whole world to see. There are millions in America who never go to church nor ever say a prayer...they have not the gift of faith.

"The people of Ireland have placed their trust in Almighty God. That is why the people of Ireland are a happy people. They cannot help being happy, though they might suffer from perhaps lack of money and the ordinary comforts of life, and sometimes even the necessities of life. But these are passing things, as wealth in itself, has never brought happiness.

"There is one thing I noticed more than anything else, and that was the seeming lack of interest in material things, and the feeling of contentment and peace that rests in the minds and hearts of the people there."

Great work is being done in Ireland..but from what I saw during my visit...the institutions in that country are not all noble, particularly the Borstals, a type of reform school, which are a disgrace. The prisons are also a disgrace...the children who go to those places of punishment are sick children, mentally and spiritually. They cannot be rehabilitated by people like the guards in those institutions who not only believe in, but practice, severe physical punishment on the unhappy inmates. However, let us not delude ourselves. Physical punishment...the rod and the fist are used in some of the American institutions also. In Ireland they admit that it is

done. We must fight these things, and we can fight them only by prayer and by sincerity on the part of the citizenry to protect our youth against punishment, by seeing that our sick youth are rehabilitated at home and not sent away to state institutions... Ireland faces a great future because the greatness of her people lies in their humility and spirituality.

(FROM FATHER FLANAGAN'S INDEPENDENT WRITING ABOUT HIS TRIP TO IRELAND:)

Advocates of physical punishment usually are intolerant of constructive educational methods. Kindness is considered as sentimentalism and mollicoddling...They attempt to justify physical punishment with the assertion that "Those wrongdoers brought it on themselves." The weakness in this kind of thinking is that it minimizes the importance of the individual. It does not draw any line between the offense, which should be hated, and the offender, who should be loved as a precious child of God...Desire for revenge expressed in cruel and thoughtless physical punishment is blind to the demands of Christian charity and justice.
